As a resident of North Sydney electorate for 27 years, I am writing to object to the proposed redistribution of the North Sydney electorate which subsumes the electorate into Bradfield, Bennelong and Warringah.

- 1) North Sydney has a proud and unique community identity. This is best demonstrated by the very active, proud and committed population participating in community, sporting, religious and culture community groups in the electorate. I am very active and along with many others, as a volunteer with StreetWork Limited. StreetWork is a local community Non-profit organisation that for over 40 years has been instrumental in helping turn around the lives of young people who are getting themselves into trouble and falling off the rails.
